





chearefully vnto God, for the Angels joyne their presence and congratulation with the fingers denotion, as the same Pfalmist singeth, Pfal. 138. In conspectu angelorum pfallam tibi; Euch before the Gods will I fing praise vnto thee: Wherefore we ought diligently to take heed, that by our idlenesse, negligence, and want of practise, wee cause not the Angels to depart from vs. And indeed there is no mortall man which can expresse in words, or conceive in thought, the vertues of the Pfalmes, and the praises of the Lord, if with a pure and serious attention of the heart they shall be performed as they ought to be.

In the Pfalmes, are described the rewards of good, the punishments of euilmen, the rudiments of beginners, the progresse of pro-

ficients, and confummation of perfect men.

The finging of Pfalmes (as fay the Doctors) comforteth the forrowfull, pacifieth the angry, strengtheneth the weake, humbleth the proud, gladdeth the humble, stirres up the slow, reconcileth enemies, lifteth vp the heart to heavenly things, and vniteth the Creature to his Creator, for whatfocuer is in the Pfalmes, conduceth to the edification, benefit, and confolation of mankinde.

Would'st thou make a confession, and repent thee of thy sinnes? Then fing with remorfe and humility the featien penitentiall Pfalms

EDauid, and thou shalt feelethe sweet mercy of God, and thy sinde refreshed with spirituallioy.

Would'st thou pray? Then poure forth thy soule in the Psalmes \$5.54.67.70.72.86.143. For the soule of man cannot either, feelingly expresse its misery, tribulation and anguish of temptation, or more powerfully call vpon the metcy of God, then in these Psalmes.

Would'st thou praise the Maiestuc of God, or give him thankes for all his benefits? then sing the 103. 104. 105. 106. 107. 108.

If thou be so farre afflicted with outward and inward temptations that thou seemest to be for saken, then sing heartily the 22.64.69. Psalmes.

If this present life be tedious vnto thee, and that with an ardent desire thou waitest to see God, then sing the 42. 63.84. Psalmes.


If thou finde thy selfe quite dejected, and as it were forlorne in trouble, then with compunction of heartsing the 13.31.44.54.56. Psalmes, and when thou hast found ease and rest vnto thy soule, O sing to the praise of God, the 30.34.103.104. Psalmes, and alwayes whether in the time of aduersity, or prosperity, sing out the song of the three Children, wherein every creature is inuited to praise God.


But dost thou desire to exercise thy selfe in the divine praises and precepts of the Lord? Content thy selfe then and sing the 119. Plalme, wherein although even to the end of thy life thou shalt have sought and searcht all that thou canss, yet shalt thou never perfectly understand the vertues & excellencies, or reach unto the heights and depths which are comprehended in it: for hardly is there a verse in that whole Psalme wherein is not mention made of Gods

Law, Commandements, Testimonies, and Precepts.

In a word, he that would give these heavenly Hymnes their due, had need to compose a Psalme in praise of the Psalmes, that so the devout and joyfull soule might with looking vp vnto God, reslect vpon its owne worke, and transport it selfe vnto the quire of Angels and Saints, whose perpetualltaske is to sing their concording parts without pause, redoubling and descanting; Holy, Holy, Holy, Lord God of Hosts. And it Vocall Musické be not full enough, let the Instrumentall be added, Revelat. 15.2. They have in their hands the Harps of God, and sing the song of Moses, and the song of the Lambe, saying, Great and meruailous are thy workes Lord God Almighty.

CONSCIENCES.

Armonicall Brethren, I have here undertaken with no mall labour, and charge, to bring the Tunes of the Plalmes, Hymnes Euangelicall, and Songs Spirituall, (as they are

vieally sung throughout Great Brittaine) into one entire volume; which are so Composed, for the most part, that the vaskilfull may with little practice, be enabled to sing

them in parts, after a plausible manner.

In my opinion, its too Laborious a taske for any Man to study the attainement of the Hebrew Musicall Accents; For the Tunes vsed in Dauids Time are too farre removed from our understanding. For albeit the Hebrew Musicall Characters are placed sometimes about the Letter, sometimes beneath, yet the knowledge of what was signified by those Notes and Characters, was onely continued by Tradition, and is now utterly lost, though many at sundry times (as appeareth by their writings) have gone about to reniae it: But baning no better subject toworke upon, then their owne weake conjectures, they have but a little prevailed. I finde yet that the Characters now used in the Rushian Church, (who bad their skill in Musicke from

the Græcians) though they differ in the placing, (because thole of the Hebrewes are both aboue and beneath the Letter, these onely aboue) yet they partly resemble one another in the forme.

Agains, I finds by fundry Manuscripts, that the Latine Church, as well in the forme of their Characters, as likewise in the placing of them, did participate of both. For first, according to the manner of the Hebrewes, they placed their Notes both aboue and beneath the Letter. Afterwards they vsed one line above the Letter, and placed their Notes both aboue and beneath the line, and that with a Geometricall distance, as the ascent and descent

of the founds did require.

In processe of time ( as all things are brought to their perfection by degrees) they came to two lines, then to three. And Guido Aretinus, a learned man (whom Hiftories report to have lined in the time of Henry the 2. Emperour in the geare of our LORD, 1018.) was the first that innented the vniforme of the Scale, (which we terme Gam-vt) and brought in the foure lines, which was and onely is now veed in the Church for Phonaskes, distinguished by the Gregorian, Ambrolian, and Perigrine Tones, comprebended in the distance of a Diatessaron, or a Diapente, viz. a fourth, or a fifth, or the Harmonicall proportions of selqui tertia, and selqui altera: and by degrees it came to the distance of a Diapalon, which is an eight, and a Duple proportion; in which three proportions all Simple and Compound Harmony confifteth; by the Plagall, and Authenticke dinission of the Tones, and Tropes. The which Phonaskes are explained by the Tenor past being the Faburden, or Playn-long of the Plalmes, Anthems, and Responces viually sung in the Church in Prose, and Hymnes

that were Composed in Verse and Meeter.

The fine lines are vsed for Symphonaskes or Parts Compounded of 2.3.4.5.6. voices &c.

The fixe lines are vsed for Instrumentall Musicke, as

Organs, Harpes, Lutes, &c.

But what (vener the Tunes were in Dauids time, there is no question but they were concordant and Harmonious, which could not be, had they not beene divided in parts. For if ye looke into I Chro. chap. 13. 16. verse, yee shall see how the Prophet David at the Reduction of the Arke, as. likewise Salomon his Sonne at the Dedication of the Temple, 2 Chro, chap, 6.31. verse, distinguished all their Musickein parts, and appointed (neh to be Masters and Over-seers of it, as were most eminent for their knowledge in that kinde; as Chenaniah the chiefe Leuite, to have the chiefe place, which was to be Master of the Song: An office, which consisted not onely in the direction of the Quirc; but likewife in the trayning op of others to fing, that there might be still a supply of able persons for that service: Asaph the next, and so Heman his Brother, likewise Icduthun and Ethan, all of them the most renowned chanters of these Times, and such as successively in one anothers absence, were to direct the due performance of that charge, so that not onely the voyce of the Singers. but likewise the found of the Instruments agreed so well together, that they seemed to be but one Sound, and one Voice.

Neither was this method confined onely to the Old Teflament, but sansified to the Church of Christ by the prescription of the holy Apostle S. Paul, Col 3. verse 16. Let the word of God dwell plentcously in you, in all wisedome, teaching and admonishing your owne sclues,

in Plalmes, Hymnes and Spirituall longs, linging with

a Grace to the Lord in your hearts.

I have therefore endeaucured for the fitting of every Heartto that Plalme, which it shall most affect, to place speciall Tunes, properto the nature of each Plalme, (not imitating Art so much, as the natural inclination, but ioyning one with another,) and am bold to admonish the Singers that they observe three Rules.

An Euening Prayer.

Haue mercy therefore vpon vs (O Lord) and forglue vs our offences, teach vs by thy holy Spirit that wee may rightly weigh them'& earneftly repent vs for the fame ; And fo much the rather (O Lord our God) because that the reprobate, and such as thou haft forfaken cannot praise thee nor call vpon thy name : but the repenting hart, the forroyyfull mind, the confcience oppressed, hungring and thirsting for thy grace, shall enermore for forth thy praise

and glory. And albeit wee be bus yyormes & duft, yet thou art our creator, and we be the worke of thy hands, yea thou art our father, and we thy children, thou art our Shepheard & vve thy flocke. thou art our Redeemer and we thy prople, whom thou haft deerely bought, thou art our God, and ve are thine inheritance. Correct vs not therefore inthine anger (O Lordour God) neyther according to ourdeferts do thou punish vs, but mercifully chaffice vs with a fatherly affection, that all the world may know, that at what time focuer a finner doth repent him of his finne from the bottome of his heart, thou wilt put avvay all his wickednesse outofthy remembrance, as thou haft promised by thy holy Prophet. Finally, forafmuch as it hath pleased thee to make the night for man to reft in, as thou haft ordained him the day to trauell, grant O deere Father, that wee may fo take our bedily reft, that our foules may continually watch for the time that our Lord Iefus Chrift shall appeare for our full deliverance out of this mortall life, and in the meane featon, that vvee be not ouercome by any fantafies, dreams, or other temptations, but may fully fet out mindes ypon thee, loue thee, feare thee, & reft in thee, in fuch fort that our very fleep also may be to the glory of thy holy name. Furthermore that our fleepe be not excessive or overmuch, after the infatiable defire of the flesh, but onely fufficient to content our vyeake nature that we may the better be disposed to line in all godly connerfation, to the glory of thy boly name, and profit of our brethren, through Iefus christ our Lord: in vyhose name yve make our humble petitions ynto thee, as hee hath taught vs. faying: Our Father. &c.
