This plan has only one scale for all the parts and all the keys in music ; which scale is composed of seven simple characters, to wit ; $\quad 0$ a and the - a with a dot over, or undereach of them. The is me; the is faw; the $O$ is sol ; and the $\Delta$ is law. Those who use seven syllables, can add such syllables as they chuse for the three notes with the dot.

In the sharp key, the is the first degree of the key; the $O$ is the second degree ; the $\mathbf{\Lambda}$ is the third degree; the with the dot, is the fourth degree; the - with the dot, is the fift degree; the with the dot, is the sixth degree; and the is the seventh degree.

In the flat key, the with the dot, is the first degree; the is the second degree; the is the third degree; the $O$ is the fourth degree ; the $\mathbf{A}$ is the fifth degree; the with the dot, is the sixth degree; and the $O$ with the dot, is the seventh degree.

The eighth to each degree, is, invariably, the same character, has the same name, and is the same degree of the key.
